

## NAMIKANGO MISSION





Friday afternoon had an autumn-warm feel to it; hot and bright in the sun, with a cool breeze that hinted strongly at the changing seasons. The sun was beginning to dip behind the Namikango forest as the shadows lengthened across the mission's green lawn. It was 4:00 p.m. after a long and tiring first week of school. Typically at this time, Namikango shuts down for the weekend, the staff all head to their homes, and a peaceful calm descends across campus. However, this Friday was very different.

Shouts, screams, laughter and delight punctuated the air as several intense games were actively in progress. Namikango staff had challenged the DTI students to a friendly soccer game after their orientation classes were finished. As the two teams began their game, watched by other staff, guards, and Namikango casual laborers who had remained after their shift for the festivities, another intense game started on the mission lawn. A netball court had been set up, and the DTI ladies and Namikango staff were locked in a heated game. There was raucous laughter, cheers and shouts from different teams and spectators, the air alive with the excitement of having students on campus.

Our DTI class is made up of seventeen students (six couples and five singles) with the average age of 28 years old. This sudden influx of young people on campus has added life and laughter to the administration building.

Likewise, our staff has felt the excitement of the new students' presence on campus. They try to rearrange their work so they can sit in on classes and have struck up friendships with the students. In the classroom, the DTI students have exhibited their hunger for growth. Even after a week of orientation classes, preparing them for the life and work at Namikango Mission, their desire to learn and their unending questions has left the teachers excited and frantically amending the course work to better suit such eager learners.

Since classes started at the beginning of May, students have settled into the rhythm and flow of campus and their workload. Initial maintenance issues that arose as students began using new parts of campus have been solved. Namikango staff have settled into the new normal; integrating DTI work and learning into their daily jobs. And the excitement has not diminished. To say that having these students join us at Namikango has been a good thing is an understatement. Their excitement for learning is palapable in every corner of campus, and their presence has given Namikango new life!



# **Discipleship Training Institute**

#### What is the Discipleship Training Institute?

This is a program where students, along with their spouses and children, live on our campus as a cohort, taking classes together, studying together, eating together, and working for Namikango for income. Students and their spouses will take thirty-two courses that focus on four themes: spiritual leadership, biblical theology, community development, and personal identity. These classes will help students learn good biblical theology as well as develop their leadership skills in the church. Additionally,

students will learn how to understand their relationship with God and with neighbors, as well as gain skills in Namikango's community development programs.

DTI is more than a school program for leaders, however. It is intensive training in becoming disciples of Jesus. Students will learn in the classroom and then immediately apply their new knowledge in a local church and community. Students will also learn how to care for themselves, their families, their communities, and the earth.

The Discipleship Training Institute (DTI) is a three-year program at Namikango's campus in Thondwe, Malawi.

### **Lead Farmer Training Completed**

We are celebrating as the Namikango Community Development Team wrapped up a 5-year Lead Farmers Program in March! They had the final training of the successful 45 lead farmers and a ceremonious send-off as they are now fully trained in all aspects of the program!



### **Mozambique Ministry Impact Report**

In spite of COVID restrictions in Mozambique, the leaders have been traveling periodically to encourage congregations. We don't yet have statistics for March, but so far this year, we celebrate the impact of these ministries:

- Gurue District 10 church visits, 12 camp meetings, and 40 baptisms
- Milange District 4 church visits, 9 camp meetings, and 31 baptisms



### **Malawi Church Impact**

Ten church visits were made in the first quarter, with 25 congregations present and about 1100 people. Preparations are already being made for this year's Leadership Seminar which will take place just North of Lilongwe, in Kasungu.
