

Ben & Team to Malawi

I had the blessing of taking a two-week trip to Malawi in July with 7 individuals from different parts of Texas and the US, including the Kessler Family (*New Beginnings Church, Houston*), Robert Lee (*Board President, Denver*) and Nathan Keller (*Anna St. CofC, Amarillo*). We were also blessed to have Schalee Sanchez (*The Branch Church, Dallas*) join us for a few days.

Traveling with this team was a wonderful experience, and I'm so grateful to each of them for their support of Namikango and the encouragement they were me and the Namikango staff.

My Malawi Experience

My family and I took a trip to the Namikango Mission in Malawi in July 2023. I wasn't sure what to expect. All I knew was that I was excited to escape for a little while.

The trip happened during a turning point in my life. I had just quit my job, and I wasn't sure I even wanted to go to college for the semester. But I felt rushed. Everyone around me had a path. They were going to work and taking summer classes. Many were taking four classes or more

for the fall semester, and I wasn't sure if I was taking any. Everything was moving so fast. I felt pressured to try and keep up or be left behind, but I wasn't sure how to speed up. Everything felt so overwhelming.

Malawi culture reminded me to slowdown. Everything reminded me to stop and enjoy life. It's not something to be rushed through. Taking it slow is okay. It's more important to stop and remember why you're doing something than it is to do it without purpose. I remembered who I was living for—not to

please people or to catch up with society. I was living to worship God, and I only remembered that by slowing down and taking a breath.

One of the best examples of this way of living is how much walking they have to do and the impact that has on Malawi culture. Only a small percentage of Malawians have vehicles. Most of them walk wherever they need to

Malawi reminded me to slow down and think about the purpose of my next steps. It reminded me that I wasn't living for anyone but God and God alone.

go, which includes going from the village into town and back again, which is a long way. Because of this, events tend to take a little longer to get started. Most things occur later than the time that was set. A church service held at nine might not begin until ten. In Malawi, it's not important when the event begins, but that it happens at all. And the importance of an event is emphasized by how long it takes. To respect the time of others because of how much walking everyone must do, events take longer to make them worth attending.

> Western culture is in a hurry. We're always rushing from one part of our lives to the next—middle school, high school, college, career, retirement. Life becomes a checklist. We forget to stop, breathe, and remember who we're living for. The people of Malawi aren't in a hurry. They take their time. They enjoy their time with one another, and they make their events last because they understand what's important in life. It's not about getting things done. It's

about experiencing God's beautiful creation and enjoying it with others.

This is only one of the many things Malawi and the people of Namikango Mission taught me. I learned a lot about life and God. I saw people who were excited to worship and loved to be together. Everyone was peaceful and full of joy, and I hope to bring that with me to share with others.
